The only thing I would like to do is ask for a caucus time for the Finance Committee meeting at 6:30 on the 24th, which is our next regularly scheduled meeting. COMMENTS: No comments.

## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT - KAY-MARTUCCIO-MOLITERNO MR. KAY:

We had a short meeting about Yellowstone Industrials tax abatement request and got some numbers from Nic and we were going to schedule another meeting at 6:15 on the 24th before the finance meeting.

MR. PAOLONE: 6:15 or 6:00 o'clock?

MR. KAY: 6:15 should be fine. And while we're on the subject of economic development, with the theater, I just had a couple of questions. I just wonder if it's ever been inspected by a professional inspector. I took the liberty of calling an inspector today to get prices on how much it would cost to do a once-over. I mean, I know I walked through it but I don't know what I'm looking at. MAYOR MELFI: We had a team of architects -- a pair of

architects were in there. And they put forth an estimate along with the work for them that needs to be done. So as far as an inspection, the plumbing?

MR. KAY: No, we haven't had that at all?

MAYOR MELFI: No.

MR. KAY: And the architect report?

MAYOR MELFI: I don't have it with me. It's downstairs.

MR. KAY: That was what we were going to do to it?

MAYOR MELFI: Yes. What the assessment was and what needed to be done. And there is an estimate -- an architect's estimate, I believe, at 42,000.

MR. KAY: For?

MAYOR MELFI: For their work. MR. KAY: Of just drawing plans?

MAYOR MELFI: Well, no, they don't draw plans. They are just going to assess everything — direct us on what needs to be done as far as the construction phase.

MR. KAY: I'm not sure what our plans exactly were for the building. I mean, I know it was a movie theater before. Are we making it a movie theater? I just wanted to hear. I haven't heard everything.

MAYOR MELFI: Sure. First of all, this is something I've been talking about for four or five years with the owner and some other folks in town. There is no question that when available that that building could be pivotal in turning around our downtown. It's not a first. It's not unique. If you look, a lot of communities have community owned -- Maumee, Ohio has a very successful city-owned community theater. So it's not for movies. Obviously we all know about the Robins Theatre in Warren and how successful that has been.

It has been something that surprisingly has been excited — people are excited about it. I've received numerous calls. I have, own my phone, calls from Mark Marvin from Warren. I have them from a community theater group from YSU. The Wellman family. Three generations of the Wellman family have called. So it is a centerpiece. And it's pivotal in our community. So I think at the price at \$72,900.00, I think it is reasonably priced where the city can get involved in a very slow way. But I think it's important to note that now that we own it, we now can receive grant money for this.

Is Nic still here somewhere? No. I spoke with Julie Green, the technical assistance grant that you just received with Youngstown and Liberty triggers bike trail and theater dollars. So you can't get it -- Mr. Sobnosky can't get it. It has to be owned by the community in order to trigger the grant dollars. So right away -- right out of the gate, even before we own it, we have the

ability to receive grant dollars or apply for grant dollars. Everything is competitive. There is no magic wand when you use the word grant. They have to be specific grant applications. In this case, it's the Appalachian Technical Assistance Grant. That's what triggers it. And you may or may not know but there is going to be a bundle of money brought to the Mahoning Valley with the Appalachian Grant dollars. We're looking at about \$50 million. Eastgate will be handling this. This is the pot of money that will improve downtowns, will improve all qualities of life, bike trails, parks associated with downtowns, rivers, boat launches, all the same. So that is the big money that is coming down the line for all of the Mahoning Valley. I am the chairman of the Mahoning River Mayors Association. I've been part of this discussion for about a year now. It's been part of our group's discussion. So that's what we have.

If we are going to make a move to make an improvement as a group, as a city, this is a perfect example. Right away out of the gate we have -- I spoke with Julie Green last week. She's going to do the application for us. We shoot out of the gate with an application that has possibilities.

MR. KAY: So the only thing I'm asking is I would like to see it inspected. I have no idea what kind of shape that building is in. To spend \$500.00 on somebody inspecting it to look at the plumbing and all that stuff, I don't think that's a lot to ask to do before we purchase it. That's all I'm looking at. I don't think it's going anywhere if we waited a couple of weeks. So I'm going to ask for that. I just wanted to ask the questions now while I had the floor. That's all I have, Mr. Chairman.

least the plumbing and electrical side are a good one. If we can table this for two weeks.
